Inspiring young people to RISE ABOVE adversity using the lessons and stories of the Tuskegee Airmen and the Women Airforce Service Pilots (WASP).

I had a very thoughtful conversation with a Squadron supporter of longstanding at a recent event, regarding what a CAF RISE ABOVE Volunteer Ambassador can do.

My position since signing on to direct the Exhibit three years ago has been to try to position Volunteer Ambassadors to do what they most want to be doing - after all, a Volunteer Ambassador has come to help of their own volition using their own resources, is out there in the weather with us freezing or scorching, humid or parchment-dry, sunshine or torrent; at the very least, they should be enjoying the activity they are assigned under such conditions!

Thing is - I have to know what the Volunteer wants, to either post them to such a task (or see they get the training to do it). And (to return to my conversation with the Volunteer) they have to know what activities are available to them, to better know what they want to do.

In the field, physically at the Exhibit, a Volunteer can assist arriving guests with registration, escort new crowds into the theater and exiting ones out, present each documentary and field audience questions about the Tuskegee Airmen, the WASP, the Mustang or the Second World War, represent these stories to local organizations and media, help guests select the right hat or T-shirt or patch or challenge coin from the PX to commemorate their visit; they can help physically set up the Exhibit the day prior to the show or help repack it on the final day; and none of the road crew will ever object to a Volunteer who sees some bit of cleaning or maintenance which needs addressing, and either points it out or (better still) cleans or fixes it themselves. Volunteer Ambassadors can even run each movie, if they have an interest in learning how. And when the P-51C is on static display, having a docent conversant with its history alongside is invaluable.

If the act of physically volunteering to preserve and share these histories out with the mobile theater and aircraft is not a fit for some Ambassadors, there are other roles one can fill I will cover in future - beginning with suggesting the Exhibit and Mustang to a local potential host they think might be a fit.

And if a Volunteer has other ideas, as that Ambassador which sparked this thread had - share them. Ambassadors by definition have out-of-the-box perspectives; the Squadron is better every time it takes advantage of that.

America's Tribute to the Tuskegee Airmen



Robert Lee Maxwell April 5, 1922 – August 27, 2010

Class: 44-I-1-TE

Graduation date: 10/16/1944

Rank at time of graduation: Flt. Officer

Robert Maxwell never got the chance to fly a combat mission in World War II.

A member of the Tuskegee Airmen Class of 1945, he finished his B-25 bomber flight training in September, less than a month after Japan surrender ended the war.

"When I was growing up, I was always interested in airports, read all the books. Made the model planes, went out to the airport," Maxwell stated. He had two ambitions as a young man - to be an airplane pilot and to be an engineer.

He attended City College of New York and received a BS in Mechanical Engineering and completed Civilian Pilot Training to earn his commercial pilot's license. He was hired as an Installation Engineer by the Aeronautical Division of Curtis Wright Corporation in Woodbridge, NJ. Bob joined the Army Air Corps and was trained as a Bomber Pilot (B-25) in Tuskegee, Alabama.

After the war, Bob returned to Wright Aeronautical and worked on the design and development of turbojet and ramjet engines. He completed his MS in Mechanical Engineering, at Stevens Institute of Technology and later received an MBA from UCLA.

Bob was a propulsion system engineer in the aerospace industry with Wright Aeronautical, The Marquardt Corp, and Williams International. He was Director of the Office of Systems Engineering for the US Department of Transportation, Transportation Manager for the Office of Technology Assessment of the U.S. Congress, Marketing Representative for the General Electric Company, Vice President of Superior Engineering & Electronics, owner of Rancho Printing in Encinitas, and an Instructor of Entrepreneurship and Transportation Planning at UCSD Extension.

Virginia "Virgie" Lee Jowell Hagerstrom December 12, 1920 - May 28, 2015

Class: 43-W-4

Training Location: Houston Municipal Airport (Tex.) and Avenger

Field (Sweetwater, Tex.)

Planes flown: AT-6, B-24, C-47, PT-17

Assigned bases: Romulus Army Air Base (Mich.)

Virginia Lee Jowell Hagerstrom was born December 12, 1920 in the small East Texas town of Frankston. She excelled in school and had her heart set on going to college, even though it was the middle of the depression. She managed two years at Lon Morris, a small Methodist college in nearby Jacksonville, by literally singing her way through in a small band that toured the state on weekends and holidays. She then transferred to Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College in Nacogdoches where she graduated with a major in English and a Spanish minor. While there she participated in the Civilian Pilot Training Program and after graduation went to work for Delta Air Lines in Atlanta as a ticketing

agent. When the WASP were organized, she applied and was accepted.

During her time at Avenger Field in Sweetwater she made friendships that lasted her entire life. She was still a WASP when she met her future husband, James P. Hagerstrom - fresh back from his combat tour in New Guinea. They were both Army Air Force pilots passing through Orlando, Florida. He proposed three weeks later and they were married at Romulus Army Air Base, Michigan, where Lee was stationed, with a fellow 43-W-4 classmate Grace Clark Fender as maid-of-honor.

With the outbreak of the Korean War her husband was recalled to active duty and he again flew combat missions (he became a double fighter ace, as he was also an ace in WWII). The sixties were spent in Southern California where Lee returned to teaching and her husband attended law school at night while finishing out his Air Force career, including a tour in Vietnam and Thailand.

In the seventies the family began a series of adventures on sailing yachts, even building one from the keel up. They sailed down the coast of Mexico, to Hawaii, and to Micronesia. The eighties first saw Lee and James in the Dominican Republic, and then back in Micronesia where Lee taught at the college and James was legal advisor for the local government.

In August 1943, the Women Airforce Service Pilots program was formed. The WASP helped free men for combat and other duties, creating a legacy for U.S. Air Force female pilots who chose to follow in their footsteps. Though WASP played an important role during WWII, they were not recognized as military pilots until 1977, after Congress distinguished them as WWII veterans.

DID YOU KNOW?

During the graduation ceremony for the last WASP training class in 1944, the General of the Army and General of the Air Force – Henry "Hap" Arnold stated in his speech that he wasn't sure "whether a slip of a girl could fight the controls of a B-17 in heavy weather." He said that now, in 1944 he is convinced that women can fly as good as men.

In May of 1943, General Hap Arnold authorized Jacqueline Cochran to see to developing a suitable uniform for the women pilots. He wants it to be 'blue'. In concurrence with the new Santiago blue WASP uniforms, on Aug 20, General Arnold, CG/AAF issued orders that 'The acronym for all AAF women pilots will be WASP (Women Airforce Service Pilots) period.'

On this date, the following Tuskegee Airmen events occurred:

4 June 1944: The 99th Fighter Squadron flew two 12-plane reconnaissance missions over roads north of Rome and destroyed ten enemy motor vehicles and damaged 34 more. Captains Edward L. Toppins and Leonard M. Jackson each earned the Distinguished Flying Cross for heroic actions on this date. (Fifteenth Air Force General Order 4041 dated 19 Oct 1944 and Fifteenth Air Force General Order 4876 dated 5 Dec 1944).

The 99th was originally formed as the U.S. Army Air Forces' first African American fighter squadron, then known as the 99th Pursuit Squadron. The personnel received their initial flight training at Tuskegee, Alabama earning them the nickname Tuskegee Airmen.

The Ninety-Nines was founded November 2, 1929, at Curtiss Field, Valley Stream, Long Island, New York. All 117 women pilots at the time were invited to assemble in mutual support of the advancement of women in aviation. In 1942 members of the Ninety-Nines were asked to join the Women Air Force Service Pilots (WASP) class of 43-W-1 in Houston, Texas.
