

FEATURED TUSKEGEE AIRMEN PROFILE

America's Tribute to the Tuskegee Airmen

Earl Sylvester Sherard, Jr. February 15, 1924 - July 1, 1983

Class: 43 J-SE

Graduation Date: 11/3/1943

Service # 0814837

Earl Sherard was born in Columbus, Ohio in 1924 and grew up in the prominent African-American community of Poindexter Village. A young man in his twenties, Sherard embarked on a journey that would change his life.

On November 3, 1943, 2nd Lt. Earl Sherard graduated from Tuskegee Flight School. By June 24, 1944, the 332nd Fighter Group was assigned a low-flying mission to bombard an enemy supply line near Aircasea, Italy. Among the pilots was 2nd Lt. Sherard.



On that mission, the belly of his plane hit the water. Luckily, Sherard was able to exit his plane, walk out on the wing, and inflate his dinghy before his aircraft sank into the ocean. The rest of the unit continued on to their mission, leaving Sherard to be rescued by a British ship and returned to the base later that day.

Sherard continued to serve as a pilot until 1945 when he was one of the first servicemen mustered out of the military with 96 points. His heartwarming return to Columbus was documented by All-American News. All-American News made the first newsreels produced for a black audience. The reels were made in the 1940s and 1950s and "intended to encourage black Americans to participate in, and support the war effort, and to reflect an African-American perspective on global and national events."

After his time in the military, Sherard went on to become a pioneer in the fields of pediatrics and epilepsy, serving as the director of the Division of Neurosurgery at Children's Hospital. In fact, Dr. Earl Sherard was portrayed by Morgan Freeman in the 1987 film, Fight For Life.

The film was based on the true story of Dr. Sherard's treatment of a young girl suffering from epilepsy and his determination to bring an anticonvulsant drug approved for treatment in the United States in the late 1970s.

Dr. Sherard's life of service and his accomplishments speak volumes about the content of his character.

Honoring the Women Airforce Service Pilots

FEATURED WASP PROFILE

Mary Anna "Marty" Martin Wyall January 24, 1922 – March 9, 2017

Class: 44-W-10

Training Location: Avenger Field (Sweetwater, Tex.)

Assigned Bases: Goodfellow Army Air Field (San Angelo, Tex.)

Planes flown: PT-17, BT-13, AT-6, PT-19

"We didn't care so much about the pay or the recognition, we just wanted to help our country win the war."

By her own recollection, being a WASP was the best thing that happened to Marty Wyall. Wyall graduated from DePauw University in 1943 and joined the WASP program in early 1944. Like many other WASP, Wyall had never been to Texas, and was unsure of what was going to happen during training. When she arrived at Avenger Field in Sweetwater, Texas on a windy day in May, she remembers questioning her own abilities, and thinking she would never be able to fly the large military airplanes.



The WASP experience helped Wyall recognize that through hard work and perseverance, anything was possible.

Wyall originally heard about the WASP program from a magazine article, which said applicants were required to have at least 35 hours of flying time before they could be considered. Wyall earned her hours by paying for private flying lessons while she was at DePauw University studying Bacteriology.

WASP training took several months and involved many aspects. In addition to flight training in many increasingly complex, military airplanes, the WASP also received training in navigation and in the mechanical aspects of each aircraft. Wyall recalls that her training involved a great deal of cross country and night flying. She graduated and earned her coveted silver wings, just two weeks before the WASP program was shut down.

Wyall understood that the fate of the program was uncertain, and their "heaven on earth" would come to a close eventually. Wyall recalled how Gen. Henry 'Hap' Arnold, the commander of the Army Air Forces, attended the WASP graduation, and eaten with her and several of her colleagues. Arnold was initially opposed to women flying U.S. military airplanes, but he was very proud of how the WASP program had turned out.

Wyall felt there would be a need to tell the WASP story and started collecting historic materials and WASP memorabilia in 1945. Her collection now resides at Texas Woman's University in Denton, Texas, serving as the foundation for their official WASP repository.

The 99th was originally formed as the U.S. Army Air Forces' first African American fighter squadron, then known as the 99th Pursuit Squadron. The personnel received their initial flight training at Tuskegee, Alabama earning them the nickname Tuskegee Airmen.





Join RISE ABOVE: WASP

The Ninety-Nines was founded November 2, 1929, at Curtiss Field, Valley Stream, Long Island, New York. All 117 women pilots at the time were invited to assemble in mutual support of the advancement of women in aviation. In 1942 members of the Ninety-Nines were asked to join the Women Air Force Service Pilots (WASP) class of 43-W-1 in Houston, Texas.
