Welcome Keri Ryan, Rise Above Logistics Coordinator




Their names are Joshua (9) Ellie (6) and Samuel (4) Zika.

America's Tribute to the Tuskegee Airmen

FEATURED TUSKEGEE AIRMEN PROFILE

2nd Lt Roosevelt Stiger March 24, 1919 – October 7, 1944 Class SE-44-C Graduation Date: March 12, 1944 Unit: 332nd Fighter Group, 302nd Fighter Control Squadron Service # 0-824842

Roosevelt enrolled in the Tuskegee Aviation Cadet program and in November of 1943, he had completed his training

Stiger graduated from flight training on March 12, 1944, at Tuskegee Army Air Field in Alabama. He deployed to Italy with the 302nd Fighter Squadron.

During a bomber escort mission to Vienna, Austria, on Oct. 7, the second lieutenant reported trouble with his plane, a P-51 Mustang nicknamed Nona.

"Lt Stiger was flying my wing in a flight of four," Capt. Milton R. Brooks wrote in a military report. "About 10 minutes inland from the coast of Yugoslavia, he called that his oxygen was low, so I told number three and four men to stay above the overcast and I would

take Lt Stiger down from an altitude of 23,000 feet. I went to 13,000 feet near the coast and as I started out over the water the ceiling finally forced us down to about 3,000 feet.

"About 15 minutes from the Italian waterland, the visibility and ceiling were poor. I noticed Lt Stiger turning into me from my left, so I immediately called a right turn to prevent his running into me. He looked as though he was diving into the water, so I told him to pull up. I came up into a slight opening and he came up on my right. A few seconds later his plane went into a straight dive down. This was at an altitude of approximately 600 feet.

"Seeing no possibility of recovery, I switched to Channel D and called 'mayday' in the hopes that he may have got out. Visibility was so poor that in my circles while calling 'mayday' I couldn't see any trace of him." Stiger was not seen again. His name is included on the Tablets of the Missing at the Sicily-Rome American Cemetery and Memorial in Italy. According to a government database, he was awarded a Purple Heart for his military service. The date of deaths reflects his finding of death, which is a year and a day from the date he went missing.

FEATURED WASP PROFILE

Dorothy L. Bancroft Hammett

January 29, 1910 – March 10, 2003 Class: 44-W-6 Planes flown: PT-17, BT-13, AT-6, B-24, UC-78 Training Location: Avenger Field (Sweetwater, Tex.) Assigned bases: Frederick Army Air Field (Okla.)

Dorothy Bancroft began training with Class 44-W-2, but due to having appendectomy surgery toward the end of the primary stage, after surgery she then entered ground school with 44-W-5 as well as primary flight training with 44-W-6, graduating with Class 44-W-6

Dorothy was the only WASP to be awarded the Air Medal during WWII. Following the war, medals were awarded to other members.

She earned her private pilot's license and as WWII approached and she heard Pearl Harbor reports over the radio, she wanted to enlist in the Army as a certified lab technician but was only offered a place as a buck private as the Army was not giving commissions to lab technicians. A quote from Dorothy, "That hurt my little old pride."

Dorothy later received a letter from Jacqueline Cochran inviting women with air flight experience to join the WASP. She started with ferrying new planes from the manufacturer to where they were needed, and was later asked to become a flight



instructor. She was an instrument flight instructor for the women and men returning from combat who needed to be taught the latest methods. She also evaluated flight performances of men returning from combat, or men grounded and wishing to requalify for flight in the U.S.A. This was sometimes made difficult by men who didn't enjoy being taught or evaluated by a woman. The WASP borrowed a slogan from the English: "A woman taught you to work. A woman can teach you to fly."

Dearest Sis,



It's going to be plenty tough to come up to Army standards. Several from W-7 "washed" today. Everyone gets depressed when they go; tonight the Recreation Room was like a morgue--you just can't help wondering "Will I be next?"



The 99th was originally formed as the U.S. Army Air Forces' first African American fighter squadron, then known as the 99th Pursuit Squadron. The personnel received their initial flight training at Tuskegee, Alabama earning them the nickname Tuskegee Airmen.

Join RISE ABOVE: WASP

The Ninety-Nines was founded November 2, 1929, at Curtiss Field, Valley Stream, Long Island, New York. All 117 women pilots at the time were invited to assemble in mutual support of the advancement of women in aviation. In 1942 members of the Ninety-Nines were asked to join the Women Air Force Service Pilots (WASP) class of 43-W-1 in Houston, Texas.
