The Tuskegee Airmen

Have you heard the story of the Tuskegee Airmen? If not, it's an inspiring tale of the first black and African-American men to serve as pilots in the U.S Army. What's responsible for the airman's achievements are their 'Six Guiding Principles'. The principles include; **Aim High, Believe in Yourself, Use Your Brain, Be Ready to Go, Never Quit, and Expect to Win.** What the principles mean to me will be shared throughout this paper.

A long-term goal that the Six Principles could help guide me to achieve is being the best mother possible. I am aware *Aiming High* is a tricky thing to do while "managing" another person's life.
